Mayflower Gardens and Grounds... Beaaaautiful! Walk this place. Isn't it striking?! Of course, sometimes it is hard to see all the landscape and plantings because of the large number of residents and staff working to create this wonderland. Our grounds are certainly a labor of love...and beauty. Thank you, to all who are making a difference in this showplace.

Golf Carts...They Are "Green!" You have probably noticed one or two or three golf carts motoring around campus or parked somewhere on the grounds. We now own two, thanks to gifts from donors. In addition, a couple of staff members have shared their own carts at times. This mode of transporting working staff and, at times, residents around campus saves time, parking space, and fuel (They are battery-powered!).

Book of Remembrance. There has been recent discussion among residents about the use of the bound record book (sometimes referred to as the "Memorial Book") that is displayed on the stand at the east end of the Beebe/Health Center skywalk. Recently, the MRA leadership, along with Mayflower senior staff, discussed the criteria for listing in the book. As this is a Mayflower resource, the Mayflower definition of "resident" was adopted.

As of June 1, 2012, the listings in the Book of Remembrance will include people who were Mayflower residents at the time of their death. Simply, this is anyone whose primary residence includes a bed on campus and who is responsible for the associated fees. This includes all independent living and healthcare (Beebe/Health Center/South Village) residents.

People who live at Mayflower but move away to a new residence prior to their death will be remembered in a second vehicle, yet to be defined. Our goal is to create an historic record of anyone who has ever lived at Mayflower, including her/his move-in and, if applicable, move-out dates.

Mayflower Residents Stay Active and Continue to Grow. Elsewhere in this newsletter, you will find an article and photo published by the Grinnell Herald-Register on May 25, 2012 that we reprint with permission. It is a story about the "Bucket Courses" that have been offered for the last three years by the Committee Education Council (CEC), a local volunteer organization co-founded five years ago by Mayflower resident, Joanne Bunge; Grinnell College; the Grinnell Regional Medical Center; and The Mayflower Community. Joanne has chaired the CEC since day one. It is now a partner organization under the not-forprofit umbrella of the Greater Poweshiek Community Foundation and is comprised of an additional five Grinnell not-for-profit organizations.

The published article honors people who have attended all six of the programs offered during 2011 and 2012. Now get this: Of the 20 honorees, 16 are either current Mayflower residents or members of our Wait-List! I am reminded of a comment shared with me some years ago by a community engagement person at the College: "We usually don't ask Mayflower residents to volunteer any more. They are way too busy!"

<u>Between the Bookends continued</u>: <u>The Butterfly Cabinet</u>, by Bernie McGill, focuses on the inhabitants (both upstairs and downstairs) of a castle in northern Ireland in the late 19th century. The 4 year old daughter of the master is found dead after being locked in the wardrobe room for 3 hours as a punishment, and her mother is suspected of murder. This is lyrically told in alternating chapters from the mother's prison diary and the children's nanny.

<u>Private Games</u>, by James Patterson and Mark Sullivan, is a novel about this year's summer Olympics in London. It is a plausible account of the process through which planning becomes reality with all of the ups-and-downs, forward and backward actions of that process. While not as fast-paced as some readers might prefer, it is nevertheless an absorbing read which picks up pace as the reader gets into it.





The Bucket Courses,

whose name refers to "everything you want to know before you kick the bucket," are a series of weekly classes on specific topics taught by experts in their fields, most of them faculty members at Grinnell College. This year's courses have ranged in length from three to six weeks.

The topics have included history, psychiatry, music, biotechnology, philosophy and classics. The presenters have been Beryl Clotfelter, George Drake, Dr. Peter Daniolos, Eric McIntyre, Diane Robertson, Dr. J.R. Paulson and Monessa Cummins.

DVDs of each course are available for checkout at the Drake Community Library.

The Bucket Courses will resume in early September with a course titled "Korea: Called the 'Forgotten,' taught by Lt. Col.

Joanne Bunge heads the Community Education Council and coordinates the Bucket Courses.
